

HEROIC: Sabin Howard Sculpts the National WWI Memorial is a cinematic, pulse-pounding saga of grit, genius, and the relentless pursuit of greatness. In a world of war, HEROIC offers a glimpse into healing. At its heart is Sabin Howard—a visionary sculptor with the raw power and determination to punch up through the bureaucracy and bring a monumental dream to life.

This isn't just a story about art. It's a battle for meaning. Rather than glorifying conflict, the film recognizes the profound human suffering and sacrifice that war inflicts. At its core, this is a story about remembrance and the responsibility to honor those who have endured unimaginable hardship.

For nine years, Sabin sacrifices nearly everything—leaving behind his family, his comforts, and even his country. He journeys to the far side of the world, to New Zealand, harnessing cutting-edge digital technology to accelerate his vision.

With a completed maquette in hand, Sabin returns to Washington D.C., to face the ultimate test: the Commission of Fine Arts. They're the formidable gatekeepers of our nation's public monuments. Instead of applause, Sabin faces bureaucratic obstacles and political resistance, underscoring the complexities of how societies choose to remember conflict.

Undeterred, Sabin launches into the creation of a 58.5-foot-long masterpiece in his New Jersey studio. He sculpts through a maelstrom of challenges: an art world hostile to beauty, the chaos of Covid lockdowns, the toppling of monuments, and constant friction with "The Commission." Inside the studio, tensions boil over—loyalty and betrayal, ambition and heartbreak, as Sabin pushes his team to the edge in pursuit of artistic immortality.

Sabin is driven by a singular ambition: to rival the great Renaissance masters. He demands everything from himself and from those around him, forging bonds and rivalries that will be tested to the breaking point. Who will rise? Who will fall? In this crucible of creativity, everyone gives their all—and not everyone will survive unscathed.

As Sabin and his team transform the stories of the "doughboys" and modern veterans into bronze, the film becomes a meditation on the enduring scars of war. Sculpting is not merely an artistic act but a form of service—a solemn commitment to ensure that the legacy of those who served is not lost to time or indifference. The true weight of sacrifice settles upon Sabin he sculpts the faces and bodies of veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan.

Witness the drama, the passion, and the triumph. Heroic is not just a story—it's a visceral experience of the power of art, the endurance of the human spirit, and the legacy of those who serve.



The Subject

Master sculptor Sabin Howard, has over 70,000 hours of sculpting from life. He wins the sculptural commission of the century: the National WWI Memorial Design Competition. As an outsider from the contemporary art world, he challenges the bureaucratic establishment in Washington D.C. by designing what will become the largest free standing bronze wall in the western hemisphere.

He is determined to pull this off no matter the cost. Like a high stakes poker player, Sabin goes all in. He risks his family, his career, his relationships, and his health. He finds renewal in the sense of duty to the veterans who served in the great war and the contemporary veterans he sculpts from in his New Jersey studio.

Directors Statement

I met Sabin in March, 2000, and I was struck by lightning. I knew I was supposed to be with him. Sabin and I were both at the painful unraveling ends of awful marriages; we knew it wouldn't be easy to make a life together. I knew it would be an adventure.

I had no idea what it meant to be a sculptor's wife.



Sabin's art is amazing, and I say this as the person who picks up his dirty bicycle socks. He draws like Leonardo, he composes with figures like Raphael, and he sculpts like Michelangelo. With all his talent, he struggled to gain a foothold in the art world, besotted as it is with vapid post-modernism and art whose only worth is to hang on the wall and gain in monetary value.

Then Sabin won the design competition for the National WWI Memorial in January, 2016.

Suddenly Sabin was leading a sculpture project that was unfolding on the global stage: the world was watching. He said to me, "You manage the project for me, and I will sell sculptures so you can make the documentary."

It sounded fair and I stopped writing novels and took up the managerial and office work necessary to midwife a monumental art project into the world. True to his word, Sabin sold sculpture so we could buy cameras, lens, and the time of various cinematographers.

I love my husband, and just as importantly, I respect him. I want the world to see how hard he worked to create, design, and sculpt a most magnificent, breath-taking piece of public art. I want the world to see that Sabin truly Gave Everything.

The result is a 60' bronze relief featuring 38 figures telling the story of an American doughboy. It resonates with everyone, and it brings our current veterans to tears.

Art is the representation of human spiritual consciousness. *HEROIC* like *A Soldier's Journey* seeks to elevate us and remind us that we are made in God's image.

Kathleen Glynn is the co-founder is Play House Studios. In 2009, she produced 'Capitalism: A Love Story', which won the Little Golden Lion at the Venice Film Festival. In 2006, she was the Executive Producer of 'Sicko', a film that highlights the lack of health care in America. 'Sicko' was nominated for an Academy Award and won the Critic's Choice Award for Best Documentary at the Broadcast Film Critics Association Awards. In addition, Kathleen produced the critically acclaimed documentary 'Fahrenheit 9/11'. One of the most acclaimed films of 2004, 'Fahrenheit 9/11' won the Palme D'Or at the 2004 Cannes Film festival and went on to break box office records for documentary film and is the highest-grossing documentary film of all time.

In 2002, Glynn received worldwide acclaim for the documentary, 'Bowling for Columbine', including the 55th Annual Jury prize at the Cannes Film Festival, France's César Award for best foreign film, the Independent Spirit Award, and the Academy Award in 2003 for best documentary.

As a member of the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences (AMPAS), she votes for the Oscar nominations every year and served for seven years on the Executive Branch of the Documentary Board.

Sabin Howard

Producer, Master Sculptor

Master sculptor Sabin Howard has roots in Torino, Italy and New York City. He was raised during the Vietnam era and has both a rebellious and a traditional approach to life. He entered art school in Philadelphia in 1982 and aspired to emulate Leonardo, Raphael, and Michelangelo. An artworld outcast for 35 years for producing traditional figure sculptures in bronze, he wins the National WWI Memorial and determines this is his moment to break though!



Charlie Mostow

Assistant Director, Assistant Sculptor

Charlie joined Sabin Howard's team in the Fall of 2019 as an assistant sculptor on *A Soldier's Journey*. A young sculptor, Charlie jumped at the opportunity to work on a National Memorial with a modern Master. Charlie was in the room for every moment of the tumultuous task.

After the sculpture was complete he combed through 9 years and 500 tb of footage to create transcripts for *Heroic* the documentary. He was there, he knew what to look for, and so he mined the footage for nuggets of wisdom and emotion.

Madeleine Howard was 15 when Covid mandates forced her out of the class room into the midst of her father's art studio while he sculpted the National WWI Memorial. She was transformed by the veteran ethos that permeated the studio and continues to work for veteran causes to this day.
